Los Mandatos Afirmativos e Informales

Commands, also known as the imperative tense, can get a little tricky in Spanish. The ideas we're going to cover here are pretty easy, but it's WHEN to use it that is a problem.

These are affirmative tú commands. Only use when:

- 1. You are talking to one person.
- 2. You treat that person informally (not your boss).
- 3. You are telling them TO DO something.

(This does not work to tell someone NOT to do something)

• To tell your friend to do something, take the verb and use the él/ella/Ud. form of the verb.

-Come tu manzana

-¡Trabaja!

-Corre, chico, corre

- Because they use the he/she form, it is really important that you make sure that your friend knows that you are talking to them and telling them something.
- There are a few verbs that have weird, irregular forms. •
 - Tener Ten \circ Ir – ve • Venir – to come – ven • Ser - sé • Decir – to say – di • Hacer – to do – haz • Poner – to put - pon Salir – to leave - sal
- You can also combine the me and te from "gustar" to add direction to the command.
 - Ayúdame help me
 - o Dime tell me
 - Mirame look at me
 - Lávate las manos wash your hands.
 - Note that as you add onto the verb, you may need an accent.
