### Notes on Pronunciation

K and W occur only in words of foreign origin (kilómetro, kilo, whisky)

H is always silent in Spanish

CH is the 4th letter of the alphabet

The letters B and V are identical in sound

Y is both a consonant and a vowel. When it stands alone or at the end of a word, it is pronounced just like the Spanish i (y, rey, hay). In all other cases, Y is a consonant, just like the English Y (mayo, ya, yo, suyo).

X in Spanish is pronounced like the English combinations of ks or gs
